ZL2TW closed the AGM for his last time, however he asked ZL2UFI the incumbent President to say a few words...below is a transcript of Mark's address.

Mark Gooding ZL2UFI President NZART Address to the New Plymouth Conference AGM 1 June 2019

Thanks Stuart - I had a look at this job some time ago and I thought you know Stuart is going to finish at some stage and thought maybe I could do that job. A bit like I thought about doing the Break-In job back in 2015. I do really look forward to doing this job and I think we've got some real issues ahead of us. Some of it was outlined in Break-In where I've written in my Bio about youth and also about membership and stuff like that. I acknowledge some of the comments today about digital technology and stuff like that, whether you like it or not it's coming like a tsunami you can't stop it.

So I could use a terminology I used some time ago which not related to what I just talked about and in my previous occupation I got onto a computer project in 1996 called the INCIS project you probably heard about it and laughed and giggled about it. It was the biggest IT project that New Zealand had ever done it was in excess of \$100 million dollars and people say it was a total object failure well it wasn't and it isn't and believe it or not, the son of INCIS is what the police are use today and I went on to that project on a 20 month contract and twenty years I walked away from it when I retired from the Police. I can remember being on the project not very long about three or four months and I went back to my home station which was Ashburton at the time and I said to the people present you need to get with the programme because things are going to change and if you think you can continue on in this world not getting on the programme you are simply going to be left behind.

When I joined the Police in 1980 we had the Wanganui computer system if you remember that, and when I was at the Police college where the IT department is in 1996 we still call it the Wanganui computer system even though it is based in Mt Wellington Auckland and we had the programme back then in 1980 that could do a lot of stuff and it was all green screen and stuff like that and you had to get with the programme. The days of old of the Policeman walking around the streets knowing everybody is gone that doesn't happen anymore.

So, what I am saying to you is that I think that in my presidency there will be some changes, some of them you may like and some of them you may not and I believe there will be a bit of a bumpy ride at times. But I am here to make a difference and I am here to lead a journey and hopefully you will be coming with me for the ride and you should enjoy it. I hope, it won't be like landing at Wellington Airport where it's a bit of a roller coaster ride and think holly crap are we going to get here. Will I survive? For those pilots out there the worst ride I have ever had was being coming into Christchurch going into a northwester coming in on the East West runway when we hit a wind shear, I honestly thought my days were over.

We dropped 500 feet and pan caked into the runway. I don't intend doing that with NZART. We'll go around and have another go.

The pilot said you'll be pleased to know we haven't arrived in Christchurch. We think we are ok. A little work to do up the front here and we are going to go round and give that another go. Oh my God. Big round of applause. Got off the plane and went outside promptly threw up! Hopefully it won't be anything like that.

With some of the things that have been said today particularly by Doug and those volunteer Officers of the Association that are trying to move on none of us are getting younger, we are all getting older, going grey, getting a bit wider round the girth and other things. So we need to encourage people to come on and do stuff, you can't sit on your hands anymore and expect somebody else to do it. Because when Douglas goes and Mike's in the background doing the Local Body stuff, I'm doing Break-In. Peter's doing Call Book and things like that there are a lot of us who are doing a lot of jobs and I'd really appreciate it if some other people could step up and do it. It's not hard you just got to put a bit of effort in. So, I really look forward to the youth that are here today, I know you are few in number and we really need to concentrate on that. HAMCRAMS are doing a great job but we need to do more.

At the Council meeting we had yesterday considered International activities particularly "Protection of the Spectrum" without it we might as well just pack up our bags and go away.

So I'd like to leave you with those ideas. If you've got any ideas, I am easy to find right, easy to find, I am not listed in the phone book I don't have a landline any more. I've moved to the technology ok it's called a cell phone you may have heard them! My email address is listed in Break-In as is my cell phone number. So give me a call anytime, Best time after 7pm obviously before midnight! Talk to me about anything and everything. What I really appreciate is people bringing a problem and a solution. Do not bring me the problem without the solution. Because I will say there is no problem. Alright? Give me a hint as to what you think we need and also don't expect everybody to do please consider doing it as much as you can.

Not that I want to spend money that we don't have but we do have a "war chest" that Evan has worked on for a long time and I need to have a talk to him we might need to start spend some of that money because if we don't arrest what we are going down we are going to get to the point where none of you people are going to be here anymore, I'm not going to be here anymore, and the last person for NZART and Ham Radio in New Zealand please turn out the light and I am sure you don't want that to happen.

So hopefully over the next two years we can make some changes and we can do some things some you will like and some maybe not but we are looking at the medium to long term here and that's what I am looking for. - Does anybody have any questions before we go on this interesting journey."

RASA calls for 1 kW for VK

The Radio Amateur Society of Australia (RASA) has written to the Australian Government radio regulator seeking an increase in output power from 400W to 1kW for advanced class amateurs.

RASA Secretary, Dr. Andrew Smith, VK6AS produced a research/background paper on how the issues of higher power at HF and EMR/I/C limits are managed in other countries.

The paper concludes that

- there is no health or occupational health reason preventing power limits for (Australian) Radio Amateurs in the HF/VHF/UHF bands to be increased; and
- there is little or no evidence that suggests that an increase in power will increase complaints of RFI.
